City Council met in regular session on May 19, 2020. Mayor Timothy A. Kaumo called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. Members present included Councilors Glennise Wendorf, David Halter, Keaton West, Rob Zotti, Billy Shalata, Tim Savage, Jeannie Demas, and David Tate. Department Heads present included Rick Beckwith, Dwane Pacheco, Jim Wamsley, Paul Kauchich, Dave Lansang, and Matthew L. McBurnett. The pledge of allegiance was recited.

Approval of Minutes

Moved by Councilor Shalata, seconded by Councilor Wendorf to approve the City Council Meeting Minutes of May 5, 2020; and Special City Council Meeting Minutes of May 7, 2020. Motion carried unanimously.

PRESENTATIONS AND PROCLAMATIONS

Arbor Day—May 29, 2020

Mayor Kaumo proclaimed May 29, 2020 as Arbor Day in Rock Springs, urging all citizens to celebrate Arbor Day and to support efforts to protect our trees and woodland. He hopes that all citizens will consider planting trees to gladden the heart and promote the well-being of this, and future, generations. To commemorate Arbor Day, a tree planting will take place at the High Desert Arboretum on Friday, May 29, 2020, at 10 a.m.

307 First Month—June 2020

Mayor Kaumo proclaimed the month of June, 2020 as 307 First Month in Rock Springs, encouraging citizens to support local businesses and to live, love, and buy Wyoming.

Councilor Zotti stated that 307 First is a non-profit organization that was started 3 years ago, and it began with the residency requirement for contractors to complete projects. It was discovered that out-of-state contractors opened up temporary businesses to qualify for the residency requirement, so most of those dollars were leaving the state. The organization has been rebranded and is committed to encouraging the support of local businesses across the state. 307 First would like to remind everyone that anything that can be purchased in Salt Lake or Denver can also be purchased somewhere in Wyoming. Mayor Kaumo encouraged everyone to buy Wyoming.

Skin Cancer Awareness Month—May 2020

Mayor Kaumo proclaimed the month of May, 2020 as Skin Cancer Awareness Month in Rock Springs, urging residents to talk with family and friends about the importance of early detection and prevention measures for skin cancer, and to educate ourselves and others about this disease.

Kelly Sugihara stated that the Friday before Memorial Day is called "Don't Fry Day" since everyone spends so much time in the sun during Memorial Day Weekend, and thanked Mayor Kaumo for this proclamation.

Rock Springs Fire Department Master Plan—Bill Boyd, ESCI, Inc.

Bill Boyd, Project Manager with ESCI stated that an evaluation was just completed of the Rock Springs Fire Department. An in-person site visit was not allowed due to the COVID-19 situation. A power point presentation was shown. In December of 2019 the study began with a data request for all different kinds of information from the City of Rock Springs and the Fire Department. Data sets used for the study were identified. Virtual site meetings were conducted with key staff and elected officials, and Rock Springs was stated to be a very engaged organization. A member survey was conducted with Fire Department staff regarding safety, culture, operations, and opinions. Many positive responses were made, but the most negative response was regarding the adequacy of station facilities and maintenance. 80% of members agreed that the use of ICS on incidents was appropriate, and 90% agreed that EMS training and equipment was adequate. Many different facets were considered such as governance, department budget, and staffing. It was stated that the administrative function of the department is lacking in staff. Training was discussed to be sufficient, except for a lack of consistent training program oversight and support, due to the gap between shifts and battalion chiefs. The training building is in need of serious repair. Bench-depth in the Fire Inspector position is encouraged, should the Fire Inspector be out on vacation, or out for a long period of time. Mr. Boyd added that the relationship with Sweetwater School District #1 is shown to be excellent. Financial reports were shown, with data from 2013, and a financial projection was discussed. The capital facilities assessment was done over Facetime, and the general impression was that there was adequate living space, but also limited storage for apparatus and floor spaces. Fire Apparatuses were discussed to have pretty high mileage on them, and it is important to add money to a capital fleet reserve fund, to soften the blow of purchasing new apparatus later on. Mr. Boyd stated that more modern systems for maintaining the fleet are encouraged, such as an online records management system that can be accessed by the department, not just with paper records kept by the City Maintenance Shop. The mechanics do a good job of maintaining the equipment, but they are not ASE or emergency apparatus certified. A GIS analysis was performed and service delivery was analyzed. Service demand was shown that the highest amount of calls were EMS related. January and July were discussed to be the largest call-load months. Thursday was the busiest day of the week. Call loads peak at 1 p.m. daily. The heat map shows that the southern part of the city has the highest call density, and that the fire incidents mostly occur in the oldest part of the city, EMS calls were shown to be highest in commercial parts of the city due a higher transient population in those areas. 96% of the city limits are within 5 miles of a fire station. ISO response criteria were discussed. A response gap was identified west of Interstate 80 which requires a response time of more than 8 minutes. Mayor Kaumo stated that most fire trucks do not go the speed limit, and asked if that skews the reports. Mr. Boyd stated that for consistency purposes, they use the speed limits. The Sweetwater County Fire District's location in the middle of the City was discussed to provide better response times and more coverage to the City. Availability for concurrent incidents was discussed. Components of response time were summarized and quantified in seconds. Call processing time is lacking. Turnout performance, first arriving travel time, and turnout and travel time were summarized. Analysis factors such as incomplete data were mentioned. Population growth history was discussed to have increased exponentially between years 2000-2010. Impacts to the population were discussed. Even with a population going down

or staying flat, the service demand is forecasted to increase. The future of EMS in Sweetwater County is in need of attention. Mr. Boyd added that the recommendation in a past study still stands, that Sweetwater County should create a single, integrated, countywide EMS delivery system that is overseen by the County and appropriately funded. Recommendations were made with short, mid and long term strategies. Mayor Kaumo stated that the Council is well aware of the needs, and with a shortfall in our budget of \$7 million, these are necessary improvements but are a bit of a challenge right now. Councilor Zotti added that he would like to see the combination of the Sweetwater County Fire District for training and response purposes. He feels that an agreement should be put in place for these reasons. Mayor Kaumo stated that the coverage is good where the County fire building is located, and should they ever relocate, this could be a good location to consider for improving response times.

Gift Presentation—Urban Renewal Agency Commission

Chad Banks, Maria Mortensen, and Sue Lozier with the Urban Renewal Agency Commission were present to give a gift to Councilor Wendorf. Ms. Mortensen stated that Councilor Wendorf she has served her time as liaison to the Urban Renewal Agency Commission. Ms. Wendorf puts 100% into everything she does, and whoever fills her seat will certainly have big shoes to fill. Rock Springs is a better place because of Councilor Wendorf.

<u>Plaque Presentation—Councilor Glennise Wendorf</u>

Mayor Kaumo added that a couple of words that come to mind for Councilor Wendorf are dedicated, dependable, and visionary. She consistently attended City events. Councilor Wendorf is a class act. He added that this city is a much better place with her and Mike having been here. If Ward 3 knew how well the City, and their Ward, was represented by Councilor Wendorf, they would realize that they got the most bang for their buck. Mayor Kaumo presented a plaque to Councilor Wendorf to thank her for her service. In 2003, Mayor Kaumo started City-Wide Cleanup, and Councilor Wendorf took it over and has done a great job ever since. Nothing has stopped her. When deciding what gift to get for Councilor Wendorf, much thought was put into the gift, so that she would remember Rock Springs. It is a photo of old City Hall, in postcard form. Councilor Wendorf added that it has been a wonderful experience. The last 12 years have been amazing. Lots of laughs and tears have been shared over the years. She has wonderful memories of serving on the Rock Springs City Council, serving all of the citizens, and particularly the constituents of Ward 3. She thanked everyone. Mayor Kaumo stated that she has done an outstanding job and he thanked her again for her service. He added that Councilors take a lot of heat, but it is rewarding to watch our City prosper and grow.

Mayor Kaumo announced that a Council vacancy for Ward 3 will be declared soon. A proclamation was issued by the County announcing vacant seats up for election in 2020. We are hoping that engaged individuals will consider submitting letters of interest.
