City Council met in regular session on September 21, 2021. Mayor Timothy A. Kaumo called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. Members present included Councilors Tim Savage, Tim Robinson, Jeannie Demas, Rob Zotti, David Halter, Brent Bettolo, Keaton West, and Larry Hickerson. Department Heads present included Dwane Pacheco, Rick Beckwith, Jim Wamsley, Paul Kauchich, Dave Lansang, and Matthew L. McBurnett. The pledge of allegiance was recited.

Approval of Minutes

Moved by Councilor Bettolo, seconded by Councilor Halter to approve the City Council Meeting Minutes of September 7, 2021. Motion carried unanimously.

APPOINTMENTS

Parks & Recreation Advisory Board—Michael Bolton, 1st Term

Moved by Councilor Robinson, seconded by Councilor Demas to approve the appointment of Michael Bolton to a first term on the Parks & Recreation Advisory Board. Upon roll call, the following voted in favor: Councilors Savage, Robinson, Demas, Zotti, Halter, Bettolo, West, and Hickerson. Motion carried unanimously.

PRESENTATIONS AND PROCLAMATIONS

Diaper Need Awareness Week: September 27—October 3, 2021

Kelly Frink, Executive Director for United Way, stated that Diaper Need Awareness Week is next week. There will be a diaper drive in conjunction with Diaper Need Awareness Week. Locations will be at the Library, Food Bank, the United Way office, and other locations. Over 60,000 diapers were distributed last year, helping over 300 children with diaper need. Diaper assistance is not provided in other programs throughout the community. Mayor Kaumo stated that diapers are a critical need, proclaiming September 27 through October 3, 2021 as Diaper Need Awareness Week, and he thanked the aforementioned diaper banks, their staff, volunteers, and donors for their courageous service during the crisis. He also encouraged the citizens of Rock Springs to donate generously to diaper banks, diaper drives, and those organizations that collect and distribute diapers to those struggling with diaper need, so that all of Rock Springs' children and families can thrive and reach their full potential. A Wish List is posted so that donors can purchase diapers online and have them sent directly to United Way of Southwest Wyoming.

PETITIONS

Luke Geffre, 2625 Thunder Gulch, stated a few concerns regarding a new subdivision coming in on the north side of Stagecoach Boulevard. Along the preliminary plat, there was no drainage addressed and in the plans it lists that this area is not addressed as being in a flood plain. There are drainage issues in this area. Any further development in this area must have drainage issues addressed. Mayor Kaumo stated that the phase this development is currently in still requires

drainage to be addressed in the final plat stage. Engineering is addressing the drainage issues. Mr. Geffre stated that the Planning and Zoning Commission encouraged them to approach the City Council regarding who is responsible for drainage issues with a new subdivision. Mayor Kaumo stated that there are many questions to be answered here as well. Mr. Kauchich stated that it does designate on the plat that it is not in a flood plain, which is according to FEMA's flood plain map. This does not mean that it does not indicate isolated flooding incidences, but it is based solely on FEMA's designation. Councilor Zotti stated that the question is who is responsible and that right now, it is an issue. Mayor Kaumo stated that with it being private land, the developer would be responsible for drainage in this area. Discussion took place recently with the County considering storm water fees, to be used like an enterprise account. We do not have the ability to take on these projects. Near Signal Drive there is drainage that needs to be addressed like this. A storm water fee is being considered to assist with funding and planning for issues such as these. Drainage is like a snowball effect, it just continues to build. Planning and designing flood containment such as summit channel do not take into consideration future growth. He added that the Planning and Zoning Commission and the City Council will be waiting to see what designs come forward for this new subdivision. Councilor West stated that the new development must keep water flow out of its subdivision, so sheet flow cannot be fixed with this drainage repair with a new subdivision coming in. Whose responsibility is it to be concerned with the sheet flow. Mr. Kauchich stated that the retaining walls to be installed will be only to provide positive drainage from the properties to the roadway. They cannot be built to handle storms such as the one from July 28. The walls will improve the capacity of the roadway, keeping water from rushing into a backyard. During the subdivision design, the impact to the current drainage system must be reviewed and cannot cause additional strain or negative effects to the system. The location of the proposed subdivision was clarified. Mayor Kaumo stated that the process will be watched to ensure that drainage is not negatively affected. Mr. Geffre thanked the City for its work to mitigate the drainage issues on Stagecoach Boulevard.

NEW BUSINESS

Request from the Finance Department for approval of the Fiscal Year 2022 Final Budget

Moved by Councilor West, seconded by Councilor Hickerson to approve the request. Motion carried unanimously.

Request from the Police Department for permission to fill a vacant Parking and Nuisance Control Officer I position

Councilor Hickerson expressed concern with the City's ability to pay for an added position not in the current budget. He understands the need, but remains concerned financially. Councilor West added that he is not against the position, but shares Councilor Hickerson's concern. The timing is an issue with funding and revenues down, no raises given to current employees, and negotiations resuming in October as promised, the timing does not work well for this request. Maybe it could be entertained in the springtime. Councilor Savage stated that many functions of this position span much further than just weed control – this position provides traffic control, funeral processions, parking enforcement at the high school and elsewhere, fingerprinting, serves as the bailiff for Municipal Court when needed. These tasks are required regardless of who does them, and when this position cannot complete them, patrol officers are working overtime to complete them. There is still an expense associated with not filling the position. Councilor Robinson agreed, adding that the services provided by this position can be time consuming, so this position is very beneficial for patrol officers to have when nuisance calls come in. Parking and Nuisance Control Officers make half of what patrol officers make, so when taking overtime into consideration, filling this position would be a smarter choice. Mayor Kaumo stated that we have a split Council on this issue, and asked Dwane Pacheco, Police Chief to provide insight as to the current employee's caseload in this position. Chief Pacheco stated that approximately 62 cases are active at this time, which are juggled along with the other duties expected of this position. This request is not about getting the cases closed, but also about not getting other tasks done. Mayor Kaumo stated that he sees the need because of constituent complaints coming in, but his biggest concern is also timing. Based on the current economic times, he feels that foregoing this position currently is best, revisiting the position next spring. He supports the need even so.

Moved by Councilor Demas, seconded by Councilor Halter to approve the request. Motion failed with Councilors Hickerson, West, Zotti, Bettolo, and Mayor Kaumo voting no.

Recommendation from the Parks & Recreation Advisory Board regarding winter hours at the Family Recreation and Civic Centers

Moved by Councilor Zotti, seconded by Councilor Hickerson to approve the request. Motion carried unanimously.

Resolution 2021-137 AN AMENDED RESOLUTION ACCEPTING AND APPROVING A MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE CITY OF ROCK SPRINGS, WYOMING, THE CITY OF GREEN RIVER, WYOMING, AND SWEETWATER COUNTY, WYOMING, AND AUTHORIZING TIMOTHY A. KAUMO, AS MAYOR OF THE CITY OF ROCK SPRINGS, WYOMING, AND MATTHEW L. MCBURNETT, AS CITY CLERK OF THE CITY OF ROCK SPRINGS, WYOMING, TO EXECUTE SAID MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING ON BEHALF OF SAID CITY, was read by title.

Moved by Councilor Robinson, seconded by Councilor West to remove Resolution 2021-137 from the table. Upon roll call the following voted in favor: Councilors Savage, Robinson, Demas, Zotti, Halter, Bettolo, West, Hickerson, and Mayor Kaumo. Motion carried unanimously. No/Abstain: _____

Moved by Councilor West, seconded by Councilor Bettolo to amend Resolution 2021-137 as shown. Upon roll call the following voted in favor: Councilors Savage, Robinson, Demas, Zotti, Bettolo, West, Hickerson, and Mayor Kaumo. Motion carried with Councilor Halter Abstaining.

Councilor West stated that time is running out. The common goal of this tax related to ambulance funding, and the County has been working to require the cities to help fund ambulance service. Everyone is still struggling financially, so he wonders what the next approach should be. The Joint Intergovernmental Committees were formed to negotiate ambulance service and that task has not yet been completed. There is no leadership and it is bothersome. He asked what sense it makes for the City of Rock Springs to fund marketing for this tax, when the Governing Body elected not to support it months ago. He feels that the City should not have to take the lead here, especially with no resolution on ambulance service or anything else. There is no leadership at the County or the City of Green River with regard to this tax. Councilor Zotti stated that he feels the same way, and he has voiced his concern since the beginning. We are nowhere near where we need to be in order to ask the people to pay a new tax. There is no specific information on what it will be spent on. Councilor Bettolo added that he agrees with Councilors West and Zotti – we are not even close to marketing this tax. Councilor Robinson stated that this did seem to come about from the ambulance service issue. He added that most constituents would be willing to pay a little extra, but he struggles getting on board to disseminate information regarding a tax where the details have not been figured out yet. Mayor Kaumo stated that this is very frustrating, this is one of those situations where the train is moving down the track and is coming into the station whether we like it or not. We know that the tax could be utilized very responsibly. His concern is that we fail either way. If the tax fails, we also take the chance of losing credibility for the specific purpose tax, which is much-needed for specific projects in the future. If this information came out and the voters realize what it is for and why it is needed, it may be successful and if it is, would the specific purpose tax cause too much taxation. He knows the intent is good, but the way it came about was not the best. This would help to fund a flyer to

give simple facts about the tax. He has no choice but to see this through to help get the information out and help the success of the tax. Councilor Zotti agreed that it could affect the City's credibility and he feels that constituents would be thankful for the City looking out for them in this particular scenario. The difference between this and the specific purpose tax is that it is for set lengths, amounts, and projects.

Moved by Councilor Zotti, seconded by Councilor West to approve Amended Resolution 2021-137. Upon roll call the following voted in favor: Mayor Kaumo. Motion failed with Councilor Halter abstaining and Councilors Savage, Robinson, Demas, Zotti, Bettolo, West, and Hickerson voting no.
